




The initiatives supported by United Way empower young people with early education initiatives, skills, and mentorship to help them succeed in school, work, and life.

# FINANCIAL SECURITY

We help individuals and families achieve long-term stability and independence.

Under the Financial Security initiative, the United Way of Northwest Illinois' goal is to increase resiliency in our communities by providing services that equip families and individuals with the tools and resources to stay or become economically independent.

The Teens in Transition and Fast Track programs funded by United Way worked to address the root causes of systemic racial inequality by providing equitable access to critical transition services for youth with disabilities—particularly students of color who are often disproportionately affected by educational and economic disparities. Of the 66 students served through this funding, 42 identified as Black, 23 as White, and 1 as Hispanic.

By delivering these programs directly within schools in Stephenson County, RAMP eliminated common access barriers related to transportation, cost, and awareness barriers that disproportionately impact students of color. The curriculum emphasized not only job readiness and independent living skills but also self-advocacy, education rights, and confidence-building; empowering students to navigate and challenge the systems that have historically limited their opportunities.

# COMMUNITY RESILIENCY

We connect people with the resources they need to navigate crisis and build stronger, more resilient communities.

United Way believes every community deserves to thrive. We work with our neighbors to create well-connected, supportive communities that can respond to any challenge. We funded programs with Freeport Area Church Co-op for safe and reliable housing, NICAA/Golden Meals to assist in feeding seniors, and 211 a resource hotline for residents seeking assistance programs.



- Freeport Area Church Co-op kept the Chicago Avenue Mission open 24/7 providing safe shelter which was made possible by United Way
- NICAA Senior Services, Golden Meals, offers home delivered meals to those who are homebound or otherwise unable to attend congregate meals
- United Way supports 211, a free, 24/7 hotline that connects people to locally available resources.

#### **Understanding 211**

When in crisis, it is challenging to know where to turn to for help. Sometimes it can be difficult to locate assistance programs or to even know what is available. This is where 211 and United Way step in. 211 ensures all Illinois residents have access to free and confidential recourse assistance services. Residents can contact 211 by call or text. Trained representatives assess needs, refer to local organizations and programs available, and report their findings to better assess needs and recourses in the future.

The Domestic and Sexual Violence Safety Coalition is a network of community partners focused on providing services to those affected or at risk for abuse, violence, neglect, and/or exploitation in our community.



The Girl Scout Leadership Experience (GSLE) provides developmental, academic guidance, and mentorship to at-risk & underserved girls in Freeport and surrounding areas that encourage participants to learn to create and maintain healthy relationships with their peers.

# The Safety & Access Change Initiative (SACI) partners Voices, Ramp, and Tyler's Justice Center

Safety and Access Change Initiative envisions a community aware of and acknowledging domestic violence, dating violence, and sexual assault where agencies and systems are safe, accessible, inclusive, and collaborative in order to enhance best practices in the provision of services and support for survivors with disabilities and Deaf survivors.

#### The Outcomes:

The Safety and Access Change Initiative increased agency-toagency communication, cooperation, and familiarity amongst the partner organizations which aided in improving the success of survivor-centered referrals, sharing of resources, and collaboration within the local community.

The SACI initiative is making systemic changes and improving survivor access in Stephenson, Jo Daviess and Carroll Counties.

PEARLS stands for Positive, Empowerment, Awareness, Respect, Leadership, and Success.




2025 saw another successful Day of Action with over 100 Volunteers and 10 locations.

# Community Snapshots



The Born Learning trail installed in Shannon is our third and most recent installation. Born learning is an innovative public engagement campaign that helps parents, caregivers, and communities create quality early learning opportunities for young children. Each Born Learning Trail contains 10 interactive signs with activities for adults to engage in with young children to turn an outdoor trip into a fun learning experience.



The Lincoln-Douglas 5K, One-Mile Fun Run, and Kids Races combines a fun, fast, and competitive 5K race with a 1 mile Fun Run and series of Kids Races that ultimately crowns the "Fastest Kid in Town".



Through a Healing Illinois Grant we were able to bring in a consultant to work with community leaders and community members to focus on housing issues and concerns in Freeport.



United Way attended the Resource Fair at Freeport Middle School. This was the second year of the Resource Fair which aims to connect families with local programs for mental health, financial, and early childhood assistance. United Way raffled off two backpacks with books and supplies with 75% of raffle entrees also signing up to be volunteer candidates.
